### **TOURIST COVID-19 INFORMATION 2020**

#### **COVID-19 REQUIREMENTS**

The Chabad Lubavitch/Alaska Jewish Campus in accordance with the State of Alaska Health Mandates, is welcoming out of state visitors and tourists under the following mandate:


Effective June 6th, the State of Alaska began requiring travelers entering the state to adhere to new requirements under State of Alaska Health Mandate 10 (as revised on June 3, 2020).

According to the revised mandate, travelers entering the state may enter Alaska without undergoing a 14-day quarantine if they:

- Provide proof of a negative COVID-19 test result taken within 72 hours of departure; tests taken up to five days from departure will be accepted but travelers need to take another test upon arrival; or
- Test upon arrival in Alaska, maintaining quarantine at their own expense until test results are known; or,
- Belong to the critical infrastructure workforce and follow their company's protective plan on file with the state; or
- Previously had COVID-19, are recovered and can provide evidence of both.

According to the State of Alaska, Serology tests for SARS-CoV-2 antibodies have not been clinically verified to diagnose or exclude SARS-CoV-2 infection. The antibody response in infected patients remains largely unknown, and the clinical value of antibody testing has not been fully demonstrated. False-positive results can occur due to past or recent infection with non-SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus strains that cause the common cold. Further research is needed to understand how this test can be utilized for surveillance purposes to understand disease prevalence in the community.

#### **COVID-19 Synagogue Guidelines:**

Visitors will have to contact the office no later than the Wednesday before Shabbas and provide proof of negative COVID-19 test results taken after arriving in Alaska in order to enter the outdoor minyan services on Shabbas.

- Shabbas morning davening will take place outdoors at 11:45AM. We are starting late at 11:45 as we are only doing kriah and Musaf. (No Kabalas Shabbas or Minchah will take place.)
- Upon arriving, everyone will be required to sanitize their hands.
- Every attendee will be required to wear a face mask.
- Chairs will be arranged 8 feet part from each other for proper social distancing.
- Davening will be no longer than 1 hour.
- Please make sure to use restroom before coming to Shul as the building will be locked
   & restrooms will not be available to public.
- Each Attendee will have their own designated prayer book and Tallis.
- Torah reading and Aliyot, will take place with required social distancing.

- Only the cantor will hold the Torah. No touching or kissing of the Torah by attendees.
- There will be no dining together and no takeout food services available for Summer 2020.
- If you have a temperature of any symptoms of a cold or flu including just a sore throat, please stay at your lodging.
- If you have any health issues that put you at great risk, please stay at your lodging.

We want our visitors and tourists to understand that the only way they can join us for davening and shul during COVID-19 is only by their full cooperation with the new policies and requirements.

We would like to thank you for your understanding and cooperation, and together we will get through this and enable us to enjoy synagogue together and to guarantee the health and safety of our friends and their families.

#### **KOSHER FOOD/DAIRY PRODUCTS**

A Kosher section was established at the Natural Pantry at 3680 Barrow Street (corner of 36<sup>th</sup> Avenue, off C St., near the Loussac Library). They usually carry a variety of items including: Empire cold cuts, frankfurters, turkey, chicken, chicken & turkey pot pies, Meal Mart frozen meals, J2 frozen Pizzas, Tillamook cheddar cheese, blintzes, cream cheese, smoked mozzarella cheese, puddings and snacks, frozen whole grain Pas Yisrael Ezekiel bread and other items. Frozen Unbaked Kineret brand Challah is sometimes available, and they do carry Kedem Grape Juice. In order to guarantee that the items you would like are in stock, please call Vikki at the Natural Pantry at 907-770-1444 or fax at 770-1445.

In addition, several large grocery stores, such as Carrs/Safeway and Fred Meyer, COSTCO and Wal-Mart, carry the same variety of Kosher OU-OK-CK foods which you would be able to purchase in the large non-Kosher supermarkets in the Lower 48 including: bagels, tuna, sardines, smoked salmon (lox), pickles, potato chips, etc. Manischewitz products, such as matzah, gefilte fish, chicken soup, Pas Yisrael Ezekiel bread, etc. for Friday night dinners are also available. Kosher wine can be purchased at Carrs' Oaken Keg liquor stores. There are no kosher delis, restaurants, or other places to purchase hot kosher food in Alaska. **Please note that the Falafel King is not under any Kosher Supervision**. Outside of Anchorage, a smaller selection of the same kosher products is available. There is a very limited selection of OUD and OKD dairy products available. There is no chalav Israel.

#### **ALASKAN JEWISH LANDMARK**

**David Green Master Furrier**, located in downtown Anchorage, was founded in 1922 by Alaskan Jewish pioneer, David Green, who also served on the Anchorage City Council in 1963 - 1964, and was a close advisor to Governors Ernest Gruening and William Egan.

The Green Family has fanned the flame of Judaism in Alaska for many years and the David Green shop was a gathering place for visiting rabbis who delivered Torah lectures and conducted services.

When Golda Meir—later to become one of Israel's legendary prime ministers—visited Alaska as Israel's Foreign Minister, she stayed with the Green family. They also played host to many VIP's, including Bob Hope, General Westmoreland, Senator Hubert Humphrey, and the Japanese royal family.

It still operates today under the leadership of David Green's sons, Jerry and Perry Green, and third generation, David and Shani Green and Debbie Grashin, who are the founding

members of the Alaska Jewish Campus and its institutions: The Lubavitch Jewish Center, the Alaska Jewish Museum and the Gan Yeladim Early Learning Center.
